Our final Nua News report for 2016! Term 4 is always a busy term in school calendar for staff and students alike, with a considerable amount of assessment and numerous school activities. Thank you to all those parents/caregivers, friends and whanau that came along to one of our recent awards ceremonies: for sport, arts and culture, service academy, gateway graduation and/or our academic prizewinners. These occasions are opportunities not only to celebrate the success of our students but provide moments to reflect on the learning opportunities and culture of our College. This was my first experience of attending all of these celebrations, and it was exciting to see the values which comprise the NUA way (being responsible, successful and building relationships) endorsed at all these events. The values are also at the core of our School Charter, a document which the board will be revising in consultation with our stakeholders during 2017. We do hope that staff, students, parents/caregivers and the various communities we serve will have input into the future strategic direction of Horowhenua College through this charter review process.

In Term 4 we continued our major revision of our school policies and procedures. This is a huge task, and the Board are really grateful for all the work undertaken by Mr Congdon and Miss Moerkerk on altering the Horowhenua College procedures. Major revision of our policies and procedures will also occur during 2017, and these will be reviewed regularly. This term we have created a Children and Young Person's protection policy, and a revised Health and Safety Policy (both of which are available from Mrs Searle). We intend to post these up on the school website along with our other governance and National Administration Guideline policies.

Thanks for the time and effort of Finance Committee members, Dylan Kiriona, Mr Congdon, and Leanne Phillips (the school's Executive Officer) we have revised the format of the finance reports received at board meetings. These reports are clear and concise and enable us to track our income and expenditure in line with our budget. The build of the new science labs is progressing and we look forward to the completion of these in 2017. During Term 4 we also had reports from the Health and Safety Governance committee, which brings to the Board any health and safety matters we need to consider.

Substantial progress has been made this term with tracking student attendance, and early indications suggest that the range of strategies in place to identify and assist those students at risk of not achieving has been successful. A considerable amount of staff time has been invested in this and it is very exciting to know that this year's NCEA results are predicted to be the best yet!

We received news a couple of weeks ago that the Education Review Office (ERO) will be visiting Horowhenua College during the week of the 6th of March. While we have self-review processes in place and are reviewing our governance practices as a Board of Trustees, we appreciate ERO reviews are an important part of growing professionally as a school. Accordingly, we welcome the chance to talk with the ERO officers about how we are doing and to get their reflections on the next steps we should take as a Board and Management on our learning journeys!

I'd like to take this opportunity again to thank our wonderful Board of Trustees team: Garry Good (deputy chair), David Tate (Staff Rep), Toni Baker (Student Rep), Nikki Simpson-Tukapua and Dylan Kirona (Parent Representatives), our Principal/Tumuaki, Mr Congdon, and Mrs Searle for fantastic support as Board Secretary.

To assist us in maintaining this high standard please go through the uniform requirements below with your child to check that what they are wearing as uniform is acceptable. Remember skirts must be knee length so please help us to enforce this.

Uniform is only available from **Clarks Clothing** on Oxford Street in Levin.

Junior Uniform - To be worn by Year 9 and 10

Girls	Grey college skirt with monogram knee length or longer White striped college blouse with monogram Ruby red college jersey with monogram Black tights or black ankle socks with shoes
Boys	Grey college shorts or trousers with monogram White striped college shirt with monogram Ruby red college jersey with monogram Grey with red stripe college knee length socks with shorts; short plain black socks with trousers
Shoes	Black polishable shoes Black roman sandals
Jacket	Black monogrammed college jacket or plain black jacket
PE Uniform	Navy blue college PE top with monogram. Plain black shorts

Senior Uniform – To be worn by Years 11-13

Uniform Requirements 2017

NB

For formal occasions ie prize givings, representing the college, sports trips etc senior boys will be required to wear college trousers.

All Students

Boys must be clean shaven.

Excessive makeup, unnatural hair colour and coloured nail polish (on fingernails or toenails) is not permitted.

Correct uniform is to be worn by all students when they are:

- Attending school
- Travelling to and from school
- Representing the College on sports, cultural and educational trips
- Attending College functions

Jewellery

One or two small, plain studs or sleepers in each ear.

A watch.

One necklace/pendant/taonga, one ring, one bracelet: all of these to be small and unobtrusive.

Any facial piercing should be “invisible” (ie. a clear plastic retainer).

Spacers are not acceptable. Students who already have spacers must see their Dean.

Hats

No hats are permitted to be worn.

Uniform Passes

If a uniform pass is required due to a short term issue please write a note to the Whānau teacher giving the date by which they can expect your son/daughter to be back in uniform.

If the issue is longstanding you will need to contact the Dean to discuss ways of addressing the matter.
