World Vision: 40 Hour Famine 2020

Over thirty Horowhenua College Students participated in the World Vision: 40 Hour Famine between the 5th to 7th June. This year's 40 Hour Famine focus was on the growing impact climate change is having on the lives and livelihoods of the people of Malawi whose source of food and income is dependent upon whether or not they have had a good harvest. A flood or a drought could mean the difference between a child having food or going to school hungry. The 40 Hour Famine this year saw individuals undertake challenges ranging from no food to no furniture and no technology to living outside for 40 Hours. Because of COVID-19, as Social Action Prefects we had to approach fundraising from a different angle, moving the school's fundraising efforts to an online platform. This move was highly successful and enabled students to more effectively raise funds to support families and children in Malawi. Because of the enormous effort put in by our students and the generosity of our community, as a school, we collectively raised over \$6700. This is enough money to give eighty families two goats each and provide them with food and income, thereby ensuring that the rights of the people of Malawi are being upheld. This is an amazing contribution from our students to our global society and as Social Action Prefects, we are immensely proud of all those that took part. Finally, we would also like to thank Miss Lewis for all the support she has given us in organising this year's 40 Hour Famine. We really appreciate it.

During Tuesday lunch times the Whare is packed with our rangatahi keen to learn new karakia, waiata, haka and their mihimihi/pepeha. As always in a Māori educational setting we always have a lot of fun learning together.

Kaitahi Thursday

A highlight of our week is Shared Kai on Thursdays. We are appreciative of the koha that our whānau share so that we may catch up and have a kai together. Usually it is held outside the Whare however on wet days we all manage to fit into our small Wharekai. This is an awesome opportunity to practice our karakia and learn tikanga around kai.

Hāngi

This term we were finally able to have our hangi fundraiser for our teina. Together with the support of our parents and whanau our teina worked hard to ensure it was successful. For many of them it was their first time being a part of the process from the beginning to the end: a huge responsibility and a sign of their commitment to the kaupapa, giving up their own time to come and help.





On Wednesday afternoons during senior study time some of our tuakana students go to Fairfield School to engage with a group of their Māori students for Wānanga Wednesday. This is a tikanga Māori programme where our tuakana take on a leadership role to build whānaungatanga as they help younger students learn about being Māori through karakia, waiata, haka, pepeha, karanga and whaikōrero.

All these Rangatahi Ora experiences enrich their college life and allow them to have a support network with each other that is at times, far greater than what we can give them as kaiako. Ngā mihi.


He Vaka Moana

At the end of Term 2 the library because a crime scene as students arrived at school and found a murder had taken place. A teacher had been killed!



They bring all the ingredients and supplies, and you provide a suitable space (lunch room, boardroom, large meeting room etc) and your team as volunteers. Sessions are 60 - 120 minutes, and 10 - 20 people are needed per session where 500-1000+ sandwiches are made for hungry kids.

It's a great team building and staff engagement activity, and a powerful way for any organisation to give back in a tangible and meaningful way.
