

Waka Ama





Mathematics






Design Technology




Pasifika News

Teacher Achievements

This term one of our PE teachers, Peter O'Sullivan, competed in the GODZone adventure race in Rotorua. The 666-kilometre course consists of mountain biking through the famous Redwoods Forest, pack rafting down the Mohaka River, a nearly 100km trek over the Kaweka and Kaimanawa Ranges, along with kayaking the length of Lake Taupo. The total trek distance is 109km, mountain bike 365km, kayak 57km, pack raft 13km, and pack raft/trekking 122km. The course was open 24 hours, and competitors raced day and night, stopping at transition areas to change disciplines and pick up equipment. Mr O'Sullivan competed for Team Swazi. The following was taken from the GODZone website:

"They came away with the Legends Trophy. For each GODZone this trophy is awarded by the race organisers to the team that, in the twilight of their sporting careers, show how it should be done. The Legends Trophy is open to both race categories and true legends, as the trophy small print claims, do not require prizes to recognise their awesomeness. Therefore Team Swazi nailed it. They were the team on the course that just ticked along and got the job done finishing in 16th place. With a team goal 'to go as fast as possible', the proof of this goal accomplishment is clear due to the fact they were neither short coursed nor unranked. This eight day course around the back blocks of Bay of Plenty and beyond, was real tough. Congratulations - you were great out there."

Teacher Achievements

In June of 2020, I decided to set myself a challenge to see what I was capable of. Having been considerably overweight at times in my life running has sometimes been a struggle, but I decided to use it to break my perceptions of what I am capable of and entered the Old Ghost Road Ultramarathon, an 85km trail run on the West Coast of the South Island that involves 2700m of vertical climbing. To get ready to tackle this I clearly needed to commit to a disciplined training plan, and also made big changes to my diet and lifestyle. The training involved six sessions a week, with as many of these as possible before my kids woke or after they went to bed to avoid impacting my time with them. However, the alarm going at 4.30am meant that I was often in bed very soon after them! I also went to a fully plant-based diet, which for someone who grew up on a dairy farm and enjoys hunting, was a real challenge but the benefits made it worth it. The sacrifices and commitment paid off when on Saturday the 20th of February 2021 I found myself on the start line of the race and facing one of the biggest challenges ever put in front of me, but feeling confident that I had done the hard work required to give me the best chance of success.

I set off running feeling like an alien amongst fit slender runners, I highly doubt there were any other exprops among us! Once the group spread I was able to find a good rhythm and felt ok for the 30kms before the first big climb. As I got to the top of that hill the sun started to have an impact as once we were above the treeline there wasn't a lot of shade. Sitting at the aid station at 42kms I was feeling good despite the distance already covered, but knowing the second half involved significantly more climbing. Not far after this point, the real climb started, and the heat of the day really started taking its toll. Once on the tops the views were breathtaking, not that I needed anything else to take it away, but offered a reward for the hard work done to that point. It was here that I noticed how dehydrated I had become, and had to focus on getting my fluids back up as I was fading fast. Despite a knee injury not enjoying going downhill, the descent back down into the bush was welcome, and it was surreal sitting at the 67km aide station knowing it was the furthest I had ever run, I was more shattered than I had ever been, yet I still had 18kms to run. I had to look deep inside myself to keep running, celebrating each km mark as I passed them, and thinking about my family who I knew would be waiting for me at the finish line. Any challenge I come across in the future, when running or elsewhere, will be easier now that I've shown myself what I can achieve when I focus my effort and stay positive as I did for these 18kms.

Crossing the finish line with my kids is a moment I will treasure, 12hours and 10mins after I started, having completed a run that I would never have thought possible for myself. If my kids, and any of the students at Horowhenua College can see through this, that with dedication, commitment, and hard work, we can achieve far more than we think, then it will make it even more worth it .




2021 School Production
