A Word from the Board Chair

Kia ora koutou katoa

As in most years, Term 1 has brought its share of opportunities and challenges to our work as a board. Covid-19 has impacted our staff and ākonga but we have been impressed at the resilience of so many of our young people, and it has been great to see many school activities continue, albeit in altered form. Thank you too, to our staff for all you have done to ensure teaching continued both face-to-face and online. We hope for a more 'normal' teaching programme next term!

We have had two board meetings this term. We are guided in our work through our annual plan which establishes the goals for the year. Our first goal for 2022 is centred on the implementation of Universal Design for Learning – a method of teaching which enables all students to reach their learning goals without the use of streamed groups. The second goal for 2022 involves building relationships so that all staff demonstrate relational and culturally appropriate teaching and practice. Our third annual goal builds on progress from last year and involves undertaking self-reviews of school practice involving both curriculum and student wellbeing. An important part of these reviews will be listening to student voice to inform and improve teaching and learning. We will be looking at how we are progressing in relation to these goals at our board meetings as we move through the year. We also continue to engage in regular reviews of policy, health and safety procedures, finances and property.

Mr Congdon's Facebook vlogs continue to provide a good (and at times, humorous) indication of the range of events and activities occurring in the school and the many facets of our four pillars (academic, sports, arts/culture and service) through which can celebrate our students' success. Many of these activities are represented in the pages which follow. Mr Congdon will be absent from the school in Term 2 as he is taking a sabbatical. His sabbatical research will examine the implementation of de-streaming in New Zealand schools. This is extremely important research, and we hope the insights which derive from it will benefit the school in its own de-streaming journey. Miss Moerkerk will be Acting Principal for Term 2 and we are very much looking forward to working with her and the restructured Senior Leadership Team.



Much of the learning would have been around hosting our Year 13 camp at Matau Marae however due to covid, we had to adapt and create other authentic learning situations for our unit.



Level 3 Biology Trip

The Level 3 Biology class of Liz Lewis went on a field trip to the Manawatu estuary to carry out a practical investigation on mud crabs (Helice crassa). Throughout this experiment the students had to pick an environmental factor to change and then carry out experiments on the mud crabs. When carrying out these variables we had to monitor and record the aggressive reactions exhibited by the mud crabs when exposed to these different variables. These variables include but are not limited to: temperature, salinity and light intensity.

We were joined by the Animal Ethics representative Dr Meikle. She was a lovely lady who helped us out a lot during this practical, answering many questions for us and helping us find good spots to dig for the mud crabs.

The weather conditions on the day were horrible. Though the weather was not up to standard, we adapted to them very well and managed to still get remarkable results on the practical side of this assessment. The mud flats were very soft and mushy. Mrs Lewis at some point on the trip was quoted as saying, "This is the wettest it has been out here in all the years we have done this trip with Year 13 students." At the end of the hard working, cold day Mrs Lewis and Mrs Given allowed us to stop at a local cafe in Foxton Beach for warm drinks and food as an acknowledgement of our hard work and efforts. Now that the practical side of this assessment is done, all that is left is for the students to write the best report based on the results gathered at the estuary.

On behalf of the Level 3 Biology students we would like to thank Mrs Lewis, Mrs Given and Dr Meikle for allowing us to have the opportunity to experience scientific investigations outside of the classroom and for supplying the equipment needed to carry this out.


Y10 Manawatū Estuary Trip

A group of Year 10 budding scientists were at college bright and early to travel by bus to the Manawatu Estuary. The PTC trust funded the trip and two scientists from Waikato University gave the students some background to their visit. Due to COVID-19 restrictions the scientists and PTC school liaison officer Mrs Collette were not able to join us in person.

Students used quadrats to sample the biodiversity at different sites at the estuary and record their findings. The university will work with the students to analyse and process their data and draw some conclusions. Very little scientific research has been conducted at the sites our students visited so they are contributing to building up an understanding of the organisms present.

We are very grateful to the PTC trust and Waikato University for their help in facilitating this opportunity for our students. It is great to be able to offer real world science experiences and the students gained some new skills and knowledge while having a really enjoyable day out of the classroom.






Term 1 Horticulture

Remember - Be safe, be well and be happy everyday.



Year 9 Design





Our cup cake unit has been inspired by Theibaud, an American artist who painted mass produced food. It's been a busy and inspiring term of creativity.





Take notice, me aro tonu - Enjoy the moment, notice the world around you, cultivate mindfulness.


Learn, me ako tonu - Be curious and seek out new experiences. Literally exercise your brain.

Te Ao Māori Initiative



Horowhenua District Council have partnered with Muaupoko Tribal Authority to create a unique Te Ao Māori initiative using Three Waters Reform stimulus funding.

The Mataurangi Māori Scholarships have been developed to encourage and foster rangatahi of the Horowhenua to study at tertiary level with the requirement that they return home and give back to the Horowhenua.

Council has allocated some of the funding from the Three Waters stimulus package specifically to support students at a tertiary level to build capacity within Iwi which will ultimately have long term positive benefits for the district.

This year local Iwi and hapū connected students will attend university with the aim of attaining qualifications in engineering and environmental areas. This will see an eventual return to the district where the students will contribute to the environmental wellbeing and future of the Horowhenua.

The grant criteria set by the panel included meeting the requirements for University or Rūnanga entrance into the chosen course. Successful candidates had to whakapapa, affiliate to a Horowhenua based lwi and commit to returning to the district or region at some point, once their studies are complete, to work in this field.

Each recipient will receive a \$30,000 scholarship towards their studies. Through the duration of their studies, they will be provided with further opportunities by way of ongoing mentorship and project participation (where possible).
