Principal's Report

Kia ora koutou, Talofa lava, Greetings everyone.

Last year I referred to 2020 as being 'a year like no other'. As it turns out, 2021 has had some similarities. In 2020 a Covid-19 outbreak required us to go into lockdown; another outbreak in 2021 resulted in a further lockdown starting 18 August and not ending until 8 September. The three weeks of lost learning were compensated by Learning Recognition Credits being made available to students sitting NCEA and the starting date for external exams being delayed by two weeks. As such, students were in timetabled classes for longer which helped reduce the stress and anxiety on these students.

As with last year, the responses by our staff to the dilemmas caused by Covid-19 have been amazing. Seamlessly maintaining learning programmes through online contact with students was achieved. Pastoral staff provided support online and support staff maintained the necessary administration processes. Everyone was definitely ready to return to face to face learning after three weeks of lockdown. My congratulations goes to our staff and students for their resilience and perseverance during the challenges and uncertainties caused by Covid-19.

Thankfully Cultural competitions were able to go ahead this year after being cancelled last year due to Covid-19. Our kapa haka group, Ngā Wai o Mana Whenua, competed in the regional competition in Feilding. Dylan Kiriona, TIC Te Reo Māori, was our staff member involved, and with students from our three local colleges making up the group, they 'raised the bar' of our kapa haka

performances to gain an impressive 4th place. Our pasifika group, Lototaha, competed in the regional Pasifika Fusion competition in Palmerston North. Having won the coveted Kava Bowl for the best cultural performance in 2019, and with a cancelled competition in 2020, they were the



holders. Jessica Foster, Dean of Pasifika students, oversaw the preparations. Many hours of practice had the Kava Bowl returning to NUA with much excitement. The whole college was on the front lawn to meet the buses on their return and there was much haka, hugging and tears.

Covid-19 interfered with sports, and most regular competitions were cut short. The resurgence of our 1st XV rugby was a significant highlight, as was our 1st XI Boys Football team winning Division One again. Notably, Olly James scored at least one goal in every game for our 1st XI Football - 21 goals in total. Extra to this he scored a further 30 goals for his Division 3 men's team.

Some exciting property developments have continued on from those of 2021. Jono Johnson, our Campus Manager, has overseen the construction of a large shade structure which can seat about 250 students. The Horticulture Academy was resited with new sheds, plots and a hot house, and the hall kitchen was refurbished.





My sincere thanks goes to our hard working staff who consistently go above and beyond to grow, develop and support our students. I am constantly humbled by their professionalism and good will.

We have a number of staff leaving at the end of 2021 - Alex Sheward taught in the English faculty for 2021, Peter O'Sullivan has taught PE for 2021, Eucheriska Bianchi has taught Science for 2 years, Sancia Duncan was our Guidance Counsellor for 2.5 years, Rowan Dixon has been our Property Handyman for the past 2 years, Cathy Croad taught Dance and Food Technology for 5 years, Tobias Meyer has taught Mathematics for 5 years, Vicki Wilton has taught Social Sciences for 10 years and been a proud Dean of Hīnau for 7 with us. We also have a long serving teacher retiring. Sue Staples has taught at our college for 34 years. She is a highly respected colleague and is viewed as 'a legend' by our students. Sue leaves a legacy with all she has invested into her students and our college over these years.

My thanks also goes to our Board who consistently provide sound governance for our college. We are fortunate to have such a professional and dedicated Board who show genuine concern for our students and staff. We also enjoy and appreciate the cheese scones from Juliana Mansvelt (Presiding Member) which she makes and delivers every Friday for our staff morning tea. This year, after much consultation, the Board agreed to a recommendation tabled by college management and Heads of Faculty. The recommendation was to remove streaming from all courses of learning at our college. This decision was well received from all staff.

That is just a snapshot of what has taken place during 2021. Covid-19 has presented many challenges, but with challenges come opportunities. Enjoy reading this year book and celebrating the many experiences and achievements contained in it. We look forward to 2022 knowing it will be another enjoyable, challenging, busy and exciting year as we continue to grow successful young adults.

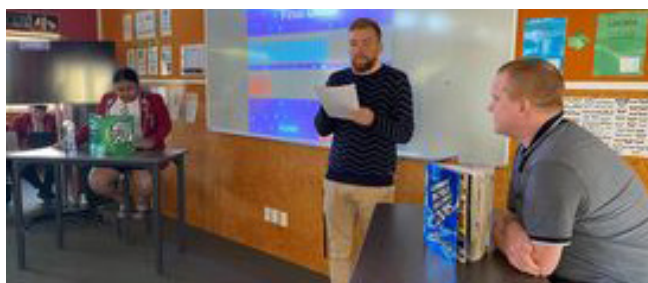

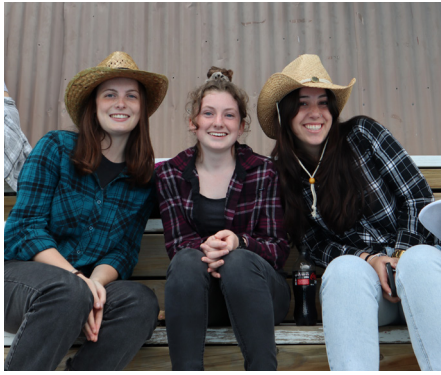
Year 13

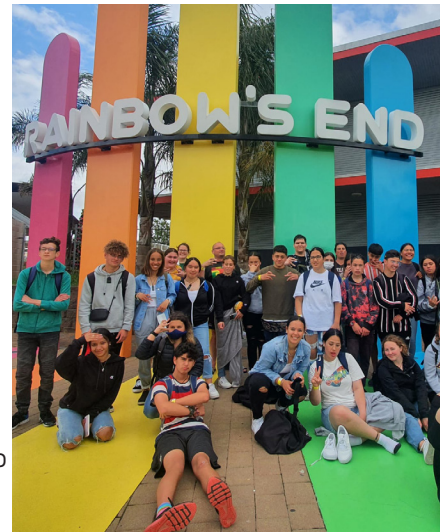

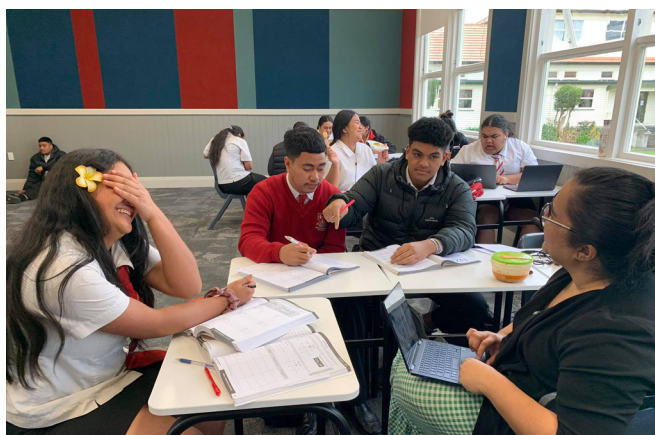
He Vaka Moana

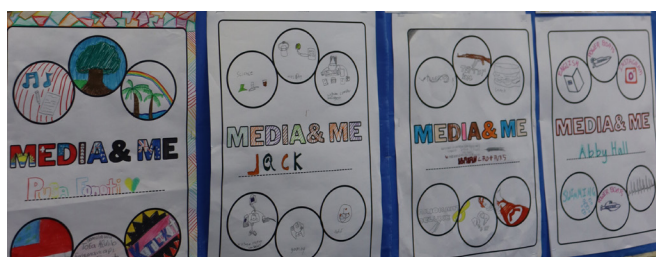
been working through their NCEA programme and growing their media understanding excellently. Some Year 13's have chosen to carry on some form of Media theory and training beyond College. We wish them all the best!

"The best part of ESOL is like taking your time and catching up with your work and asking for help when you need it" - Leone, Year 10

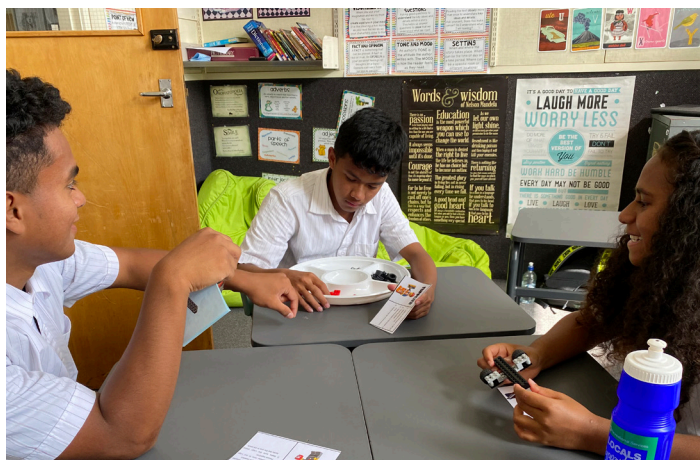

Mathematics

2021 has been a positive and exciting year in the Mathematics Faculty. We have been working hard to continue to develop and deliver an engaging and contemporary mathematics curriculum for our ākonga. This has included the creation of teaching and learning sheets so students can experience a more differentiated learning programme, choosing activities and levels of learning that best fit their needs.

Just a few of this year's highlights include:

Our Year 9 Math classes visiting Te Puna O Te Matauranga, our college whare, for a whakaaturanga (presentation) on Geometry from Matua Dylan. This korero focused on the geometrical transformations present in the kōwhaiwhai patterns within the whare and on the meanings behind them. Students were then encouraged to create their own design that reflected their whānau and incorporated the transformations they'd learnt about. It was a great opportunity for our rangatahi to create links between their mathematical learning and Māori culture.

Maths Week which saw all ākonga, kura wide, encouraged to answer a different mathematical problem that was found in the notices each day. There were individual and whānau spot prizes for correct entries as well as house points given for the most correct entries over the entire week.

'Student of the Month' being awarded in each of our Year 9 and Year 10 classes. This is our way of

acknowledging students who strive to uphold our NUA values in their classes. Each month, a student from each junior class was nominated by their teacher for modeling one or more of the attributes of the NUA Way - Being Successful, Building Relationships and Being Responsible. Students were awarded with a certificate as well as an invitation to a celebratory pizza lunch.

The beginning of the year saw Steve Marshall and myself join the accomplished existing rōpū of Tobias Meyer, Bethany Nicholas, Phillip Ferzli, Nada El Hosseny, and Brooke Hooper. As I reflect on my first year at Horowhenua College, I am feeling incredibly privileged to have been able to get to know and teach some of our amazingly talented and amiable ākonga. ACCOUNTING

For Accounting at Level 1, students have had the opportunity to learn about cash handling and basic book keeping processes for households, community organisations and small businesses. Throughout the course, ākonga learned about filling out financial documents and statements, types of payment methods, both electronic and physical, double entry book keeping and the basics of dealing with GST.

The course has been largely practical, requiring students to explore types of income, expenses, assets and liabilities for a multitude of business types as they filled in financial documents and statements. As part of the course, ākonga were also encouraged to explore the use of spreadsheets, including the use of formulas, in order to make their work more accurate and professional looking.

At Level 2 and 3 ākonga were given the opportunity to reinforce and extend skills learned in previous years, as well as examining subsystems to manage inventory, accounts receivable and job costing. They also had an opportunity to explore accounting for partnerships, companies and management accounting leading to decision making. Students also looked at how to process transactions on accounting software (MYOB).

Teaching & Learning Highlights:

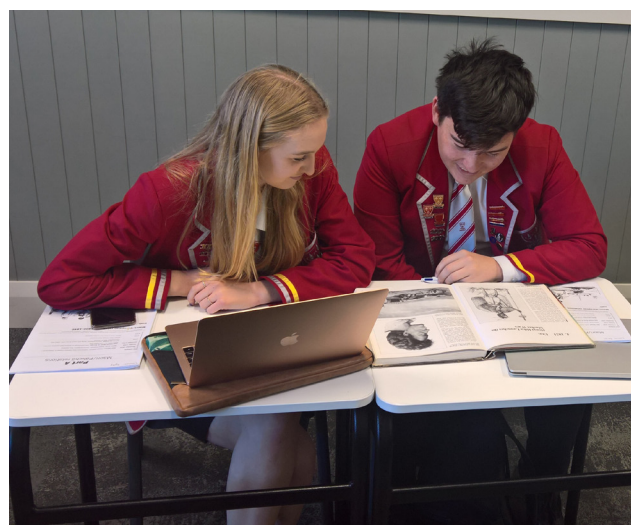
Online learning via Google Classroom was well established in all Year 9 – 13 Social Science classes early in Term 1 so when the lock-down happened it was an easy transition into full time online learning.

Year 9 students began the year with a unit called 'Sacred and Special Places'. One aspect of this unit is a local study focusing on Lake Horowhenua where students learnt about the history and the spiritual significance of the lake to the Muaūpoko Iwi.

Year 10 Social Studies students in Term 3 and Term 4 are undertaking study in a unit called 'Forming a Nation' that focuses on New Zealand History from Māori settlement right through to the 1970s. This unit fits in well with the Aotearoa-New Zealand Histories' curriculum that will be compulsory for all schools in 2022.

Level 1 Studies of Society students took social action in the Amnesty International Freedom Challenge. This year the focus was 'Nowhere to Hide' and investigated the human rights abuses suffered by the Uyghurs in China. Due to Covid Level 2 the students were limited in the actions they could take.

Level 2 Social Philosophy was a new subject this year. The students spent time investigating and analysing the social action taken by 'Soul' at Ihumātao.



Level 3 Sociology students focused their social action on 'Influencing a Policy'. The policies chosen were wide and varied including improvements in mental health funding, arming the New Zealand Police and the push to gender-neutral school uniforms.

Level 2 History students' focus for their research this year was on protest. Topics chosen included the 1981 Springbok tour, Parihaka, nuclear free protests and New Zealand women's suffrage.

Level 3 History students researched and analysed events and places of significance to New Zealand. Students focused on topics including the Dawn Raids, the Mount Erebus accident, the Pike River mine disaster and The 1918 influenza pandemic.

Level 2 Tourism students worked on a variety of units throughout the year including Work Roles in Tourism, Knowledge of New Zealand as a Tourist Destination and Knowledge of Tourist Characteristics and Needs.

To all the students sitting external achievement standards, we wish you success and hope that you made the most of the revision opportunities offered to you in the weeks leading up to the exams. To the Year 13 students who are leaving at the end of the year, we wish you well for the future and trust that the skills that you have gained from the Social Science subjects studied in your five years with us will help you in your future study and employment opportunities. To those of you (both staff and students) who will be returning in 2022, have a safe and relaxing break and we look forward to seeing you all in February back here at Nua.

Science

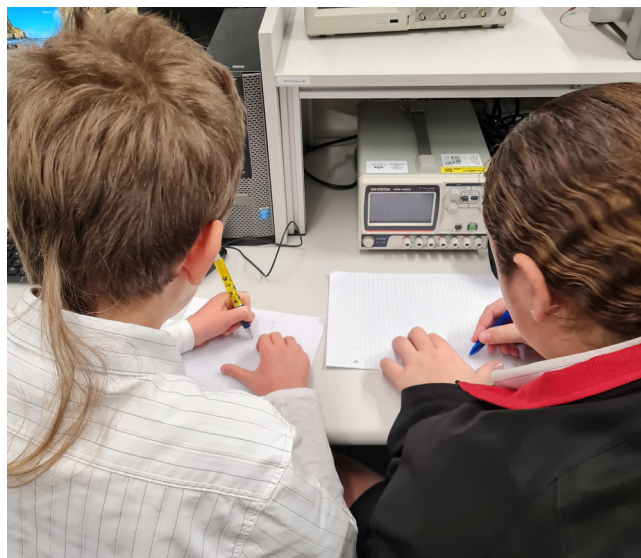
This year has presented its challenges with students learning from home for several weeks.

As Lockdown began several students participated with eventually 140 students of our students taking part. Entry was free for all students. Students earned points by learning and revising curriculum-aligned content.

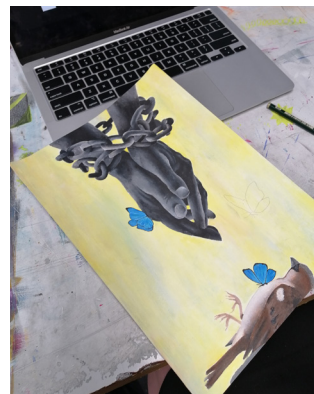

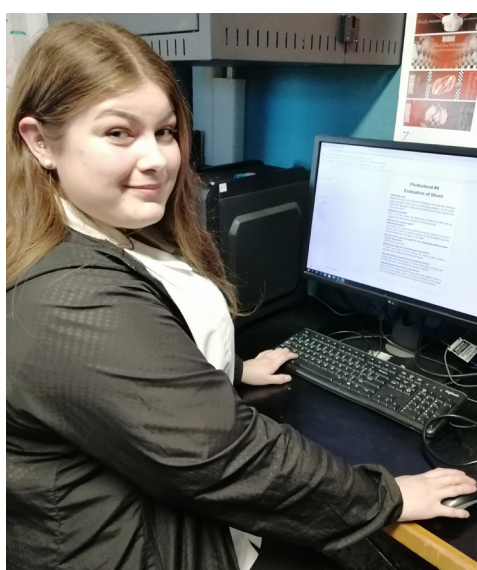
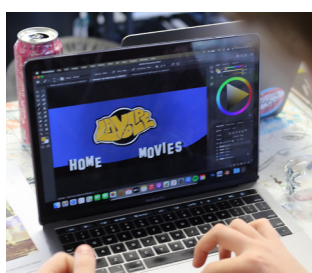
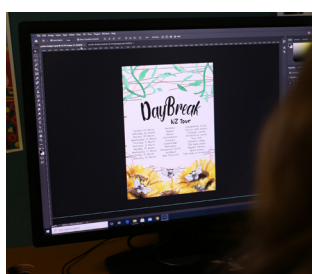


PHOTOGRAPHY and DESIGN

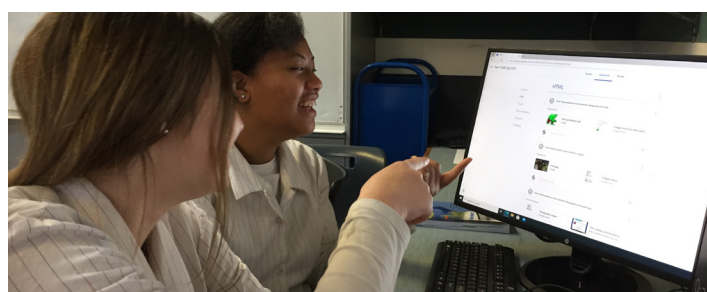
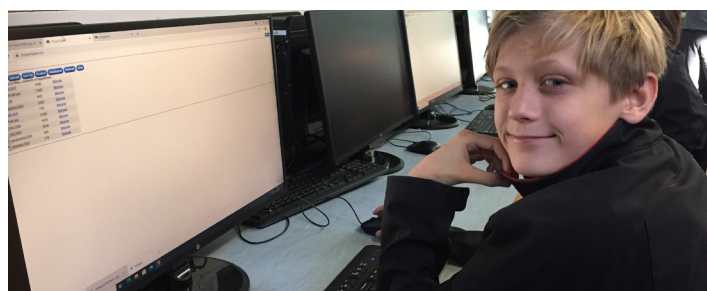
DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY

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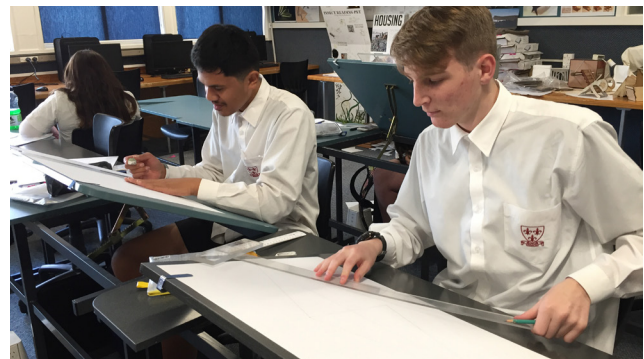
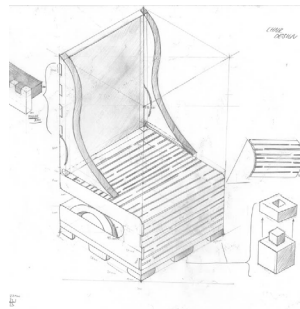
DESIGN & VISUAL COMMUNICATION

Physical Education



The year has been a time of consolidating the Health and Physical Education Department. Stephanie McKenzie and Rebecca Davidson took on their second year of teaching with fresh perspectives and enthusiasm. Madeline Beckley took on study to further advance her teaching career. She has done a great job at balancing teaching and studying. This year we saw Daniel Riggs take on teacher in charge of Outdoor Education with passion and organisational skills like no other. Melissa Signal had the year off, taking in every moment of being a new mum. We look forward to having her back in the Department as our HOF. During this time Peter O'Sullivan took on a long-term relieving position to cover Melissa's classes.

The junior units have taken a bit of an overhaul. We have a 2-year program for the juniors and therefore Year 9 and 10 students are all doing the same junior PE units which allow a sense of whanaungatanga. They have engaged in units such as athletics, swimming confidence, fitness, volleyball, international games, ethics, and touch. Through these units they learned about the values in sport, how to be socially responsible, fitness components, and interpersonal skills. Junior Health has seen students gain skills related to areas in mental health, coping strategies, loss and grief, drug-related issues, sexuality, nutrition, and interpersonal skills.

Health Plus

2021 saw the first intake of Year 9s experiencing Health Plus, with so much popularity Health Plus was offered in two lines throughout 2021. The main reason students chose Health Plus was to gain a better understanding of themselves as a whole. The students have engaged in a variety of practical ways to enhance the four areas of their well-being. These activities have included yoga, mindfulness, colouring in, walking and guided meditation. Students leave Health Plus with a variety of coping skills to enhance their overall well-being to help build their confidence and ability to make better life decisions.

High-Performance Sports

High-Performance Sports focus has been on sport-specific websites using google sites. Their websites are targeted at a level for new athletes that are interested in giving their sport a go. Their websites include a sports profile, goal setting, sport-specific fitness tests, a sports nutrition plan, and a mini training program. Each term the students have challenged themselves through a variety of different fitness tests. The tests include the BRONCO, beep test, and the HPSP tests. Human anatomy and components of fitness are a huge focus.

Outdoor Education

Outdoor Education is offered at all levels for the first time. Starting in Year 9 students begin building their skills in various outdoor pursuits while also developing the essential characteristics of resilience, empathy, and perseverance. At senior levels, this includes both day trips and overnight stays out of school. These include kayaking trips, tramping, biking, and rock climbing. For Year 11, the multi-day trip involved mountain biking on the Remutaka Cycle Trail over two days while the Year 12 and 13 class participated in a three day camping and survival trip in the Tararua Ranges.

Senior Health

Student voice for Levels 2 and 3 Health informed the internal focus. The first internal for Level 2 saw students analyse issues that were related to sexuality and gender before developing strategies to address the issues. Level 3 started with looking at ways of treating health conditions with alternatives and western treatments. Level 2 then looked at factors that could influence a person's ability to manage change or whether a person is resilient. Two guest speakers talked about how they overcome their challenges. One of the speakers was Mary Fisher, 2016 Paralympic gold medalist, sharing her story about being blind. Level 3's analysed immunisation and the impact on well-being due to laws and policies. To close 2021 students are focusing on the external assessment,

focusing on adolescent health issues at Level 2 and Health Promotion models at Level 3.

Senior PE and Sport Science

Throughout PE and Sport Science there is a huge focus on what influences our participation, how we influence others and taking action to support others to be active. PE has had more of a focus on critical themes such as trends, themes in sport, anatomy and biomechanics in sport, whereas Sport Science has focussed on how to function as a group and being an effective team. In Level 2 there is more of a community feel through coaching in our local schools such as Levin Intermediate. Students also participate in a sport and their performance is

assessed, this year it was indoor bowls. Finally, Level 2 and 3 PE continue to look at biophysical principles to look at the intricacies of how to be an excellent athlete.

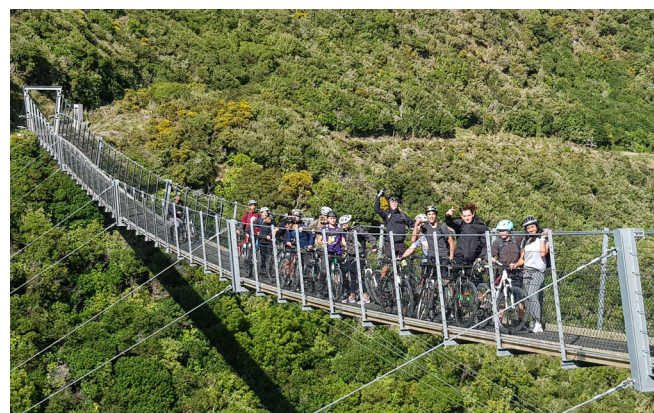
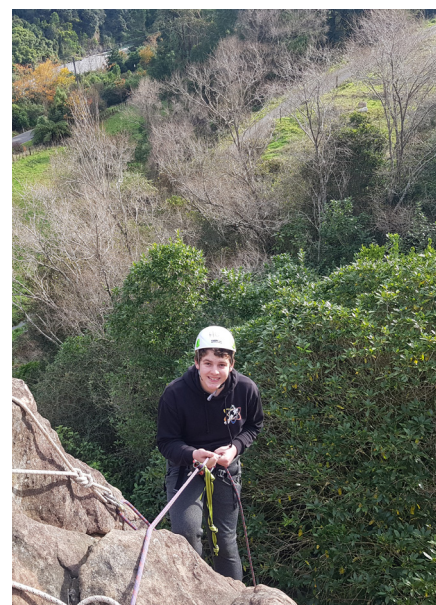

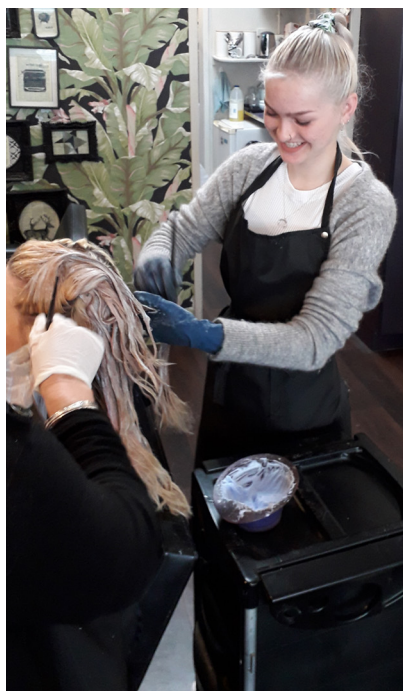
GATEWAY PROGRAMME
