Service Academy

On the 17th of June the Horowhenua College Services Academy departed from school and went on an hour-long journey to the Ruahine Forest Park. 23 students arrived holding their tramping packs and tents, ready to get started. They completed a 5-day bushcraft course alongside the New Zealand Army where they learned about surviving in the bush and completed difficult tramps as a group.

We engaged in various survival and bushcraft activities throughout the camp, such as map reading and navigation, camping and hiking techniques, building shelters for survival, and analysing weather patterns. These exercises were created to provide us with the same information and practical skills that soldiers get in order to survive in harsh conditions. We also completed 2 tramps over the course, the Deerford loop track (5.3km), and the Manawatu gorge track (11.2km). In total, we tramped over 16.5km altogether. The last track, Homes Ridge Hut (Dannevirke side), was impassable due to the stream being flooded so we went along the roadside doing navigation, relating the map to the surroundings, learning what a valley is, a saddle and a ridgeline, and identifying these features on the map.

Multiple academies from across the Lower North Island attended this course with the other six academies completing their course a week prior in the Whirinaki State Forest area in Murupara.

Despite the cold and wet weather, we embraced the adversity and successfully completed the course. This harsh weather tested our resilience and built character, forcing us to push through and keep going. This course taught us valuable life lessons and was a fun time for all. We were able to put these lessons into practice during our tramps, having to navigate trails and calculate how long we had until the end, or lighting up a gas cooker to cook our lunch in the middle of the forest.

This course ensures students not only succeed academically but also develop life skills that will prove useful in the future. The Horowhenua College Services Academy completed the course as a team and we are looking forward to doing it again next year.







A bonus for Peyton was that his Great Grandfather is a resident and was ultra proud to see Peyton play!






Rangatahi Ora
