I encourage you to read the Frequently Asked Questions, and the Enrolment Zone Information, and to make a submission to the Ministry on your preferences. This is as simple as sending an email to the Ministry of Education and giving them your thoughts. The address for feedback is to network.lowerhutt@education.govt.nz, and this should reach the Ministry by 14th July 2025.

Mr Congdon has been away on sabbatical this term. We look forward to his return and his insights on trauma-informed practice, the subject of his sabbatical research. Mr Hokianga has been acting tumuaki and has done a wonderful job in leading the school through an extremely busy term. We are grateful to him for his time, commitment, and care, and to our Senior Leadership Team, Deans, and other staff who took on additional responsibilities in Mr Congdon's absence.

It was a great day of learning which has led thoughts and conversations since. Our students were inspired and committed to leading this year's 40 Hour Challenge to raise funds and awareness for communities in the Solomon Islands.

Japan

After a lengthy 13-hour trip, they finally arrived at Haneda International Airport, Tokyo, ready to go.

Their five days and four nights in the vibrant city of Tokyo were packed with wonderful experiences. The amusements of Tokyo DomeCity, the magical kingdom of Tokyo Disneyland, and the hypnotic digital art of TeamLab Planets were some of the highlights. They also stopped by the serene beauty of Meiji Jingu, a stunning Shinto shrine, and took in panoramic views of stunning beauty from the iconic Tokyo Skytree.

A highlight of their Tokyo stay was a visit to our sister school, Namiki High School, where our students made our college proud by performing the Haka and fostering friendships with the other students. They then departed for Kyoto for a 2-night stay. There, they were exposed to the Nishiki markets, the Kyoto Ninja & Samurai museum and two more significant Shinto shrines: Fushimi Inari with its thousands of red torii gates, and Kiyomizu-Dera Temple with its famous wooden stage.

They learned to prepare Okonomiyaki that night, a traditional Japanese hotplate dish. And the next day, they visited Miyajima Island, a beautiful island famous for its roaming deer and large Torii gate floating in the water. They then took the Shinkansen (bullet train) to Osaka for their final night in Japan. That night at dinner, they played games and thanked each other, giving gifts and speeches that were very emotional.

Overall, our students represented our college amazingly. They approached each experience with energy and courtesy and really enjoyed the trip after making friends and memories to last a lifetime.
